A TALE OF TWO SONS

How can two boys born to the same parents be so different? It is apparent that humans are created free moral agents. We have ability to reason, think, react, and choose between good and evil. Cain and Abel, sons of Adam and Eve, are an example (See Genesis 4). Esau and Jacob, twin sons of Isaac and Rebekah, also illustrate the point (See Genesis 25:20-34ff). A third example involves the two sons in the powerful "Prodigal Son" parable" delivered by Jesus (Read Luke 15:11-32).

"A certain man had two sons" is how the parable begins. The first part of the parable (vs. 12-24), deals with "the younger son". The second part of the parable is devoted to "his older son" (vs. 25-32). Two sons of the same father, but so different in disposition! The older son **stayed** while the younger **strayed**. The older **worked** while the younger "wasted" (A "prodigal" is a waster"). The older **served** while the younger **shirked**.

It would appear, as expected, that the older son is more responsible. The younger is more restless and reckless. He is clearly more demanding — "I want what's coming to me". Upon receiving his part of the inheritance, in a few days, he "gathered all together ("Got to get out of here"), journeyed to a far country ("The grass is always greener"), and wasted his possessions with prodigal living ("Easy come, easy go")" (v. 13). You know the rest of the story.

The penitent prodigal's return to his watching and waiting father caused rejoicing among all the household – except the older son and brother! Upon coming in from the field he inquired of a servant what all the festivities meant. When told, he responded in anger refusing to go in! So, his father came out to plead with him, only to be met with an angry lecture about all the injustices and neglect he, as the older son, had experienced! Had he been seething for years?

Why did the older brother not go forth, search for his "little brother", and bring him home? Some "older brothers" have that instinct. His father would have, no doubt, given him leave from his "service" in the field (see v.29). May we never get so caught up in "routine" service that we forget our "primary" service of seeking and saving the lost (Luke 19:10).

FROM THE PREACHER'S HEART:
